Spruce Creek Park Covid-19 Limitations

Due to the recent challenges our community faces from Covid-19, RVF has had to impose limitations on the children's play area and nature trail in Spruce Creek Park.



Please keep in mind the following:

- Utensils have been removed from the Mud Kitchen
- Trash cans have been removed carry all trash out!
- Lending library has been emptied. Please do not deliver any new books at this time.

Please use equipment at your own risk. We are not able to sanitize equipment. We encourage everyone to avoid close contact (remain at least 6 feet apart). If you see the area is crowded, we highly suggest you avoid it.

If you, your children, grandchildren feel ill, please stay home. Also, please make sure to wash your hands often. The portajohn is still available but we recommend avoiding its use if possible to help prevent the spread of germs. For those who visit often, you will see signs posted at the park.

Rockfish Valley Trails System Covid-19 Updates

Our trails are still open for public use at this time. We may close the trails if trash piles up.

There are several updates to be aware of:

- 1. Trash cans are removed.
- 2. Take everything home including dog poop.
- 3. Please keep all dogs on a leash.
- 4. Please follow all CDC guidelines, including six foot separations.

Earth Day Nelson Festival: Before Covid-19





After Covid-19: Earth Day Nelson Has Gone Digital



As RVF adapts to the unexpected changes caused by Covid-19, we have decided to go digital to celebrate Earth Day's 50th international anniversary.

The Earth Day Nelson Festival originally scheduled for April 19 has been tentatively postponed to *Sunday, August 23, 2020,* and will be combined with **RVF's 15th anniversary** celebration that weekend as well as the 10th anniversary of our Rockfish Loop Trail. This celebration is a big deal for our planet! More details about this event will come in the coming months and available shortly from the website.

In order to celebrate Earth Day Nelson 2020 digitally, all students in the Nelson County area (NCPS, homeschoolers, North Branch, Afton Christian School, etc.) as well as anyone in the surrounding counties (Albemarle, Augusta, Amherst, Rockbridge, etc.) and cities thereof are invited to participate in our digital Earth-Art-Athon, which will replace our poster contest that we previously had scheduled to take place at our festival. Submissions will be accepted until Wednesday, June

10, 2020. Raffle winners will be announced June 12th.

Additionally, RVF will be hosting a daily **Earth Day Challenge** on our <u>Facebook page</u> from now until April 25. Each day, there will be a post about actions individuals and families can do to celebrate and take care of the planet during a pandemic. Instructions and Guidelines for Earth-Art-Athon:

Q: How do I submit?

A: There are several options for submitting your eco-art:

1) If you are under 13 or over 13 & don't have Facebook, have your parent post for you directly on our Facebook

along with the hashtag **#earthdaynelson2020**,

- 2) If you or your parents don't have Facebook, email us your submission to programdirector@rockfishvalley.org, 3) If you don't have internet access, give your art (or a copy of it) to your teacher or other school staff during designated pickup/drop off dates & times, & ask them to send us a picture of your submission.
- *Please let us know if you want to be anonymous. Likewise, feel free to submit a picture of yourself if you would like to have that posted alongside your submission.

Q: When do I need to submit by?

A: Submit your entr(ies) by **Wednesday**, **June 10th.** We will not accept entries after this time.

Q: Will there be any prizes?

A: We will do a raffle and pull 10 names from a hat. Those 10 names will win a special Earth Day t-shirt to take home. Other prizes will also be included - but these will be a surprise! The more entries you submit, the more likely you are to win! Winners will be announced on Friday, June 12th.

Q: I'm a parent. How involved should I be?

A: Provide your kids with info & supplies but limit your involvement in creating the art. Let them take ownership!

Q: Do you care if I copied an idea from someone else?

A: We do not mind if you found an idea that someone else did and want to put your own spin on it, but we will not accept entries that are plagiarized (example: you copied a picture that someone else created and posted on the internet and posted that as your own creation). Any plagiarized entries will be automatically disqualified.

Q: I'm having some trouble getting started. Do you have any prompts for inspiration?

A: We sure do!

What is beautiful about your backyard? • What kind of animals, plants, water, or rocks do you think are beautiful? • How can you keep your backyard beautiful?

Q: What kind of art can I submit?

A: Any form of artwork will be accepted! This includes *visual* (graphic design on computers, photography, collages, paintings, drawings, in any medium, i.e. charcoal, crayons, pencils, markers, multimedia, items found in nature); *3D* (woodworking, sculpture, crafts, fabric, clay, beading, upcycled art using bottle caps, bottles, etc.), *performance** (songs, dances, short skits, comedy, miming, instrumental compositions on piano, guitar, clarinet, etc.), *language* (poems, prose, short stories, plays), etc. Anything goes as long as it can be considered art and is about celebrating the earth and/or protecting our planet. *Please keep performance entries under 2 minutes.

Q: How will you know which one is mine?

A: Regardless of how you submit, include your name, grade, school, teacher, and the title of your artwork with your submission.

Q: How will you be displaying entries?

A: We will have these on our Facebook page under the event called "Earth Day Nelson Eco-Art Show for Kids" which will be active by Friday, March 27. Entries will also be posted on our website at www.rockfishvalley.org in a rotating slideshow. Don't forget to add the hashtag #earthdaynelson2020 to your entries!

Q: Am I only allowed to submit one entry?


A: No. You can submit as many as you want! There is no limit. Have fun and get creative!

Q: Are there any themes for this art show?

A: Our focuses are Earth Day, Arbor Day, & Covid-19 (coronavirus). Be creative in how you want to incorporate those into your artwork. If possible, keep Nelson County in mind, since our original theme was "Celebrating the Beauty of Nelson County."

Celebrating the History of the Wintergreen Community (\$20)



We had scheduled a book signing April 19th during our Earth Day Nelson Festival but have had to postpone that. We will reschedule once it is safe. Stay tuned for details!


I Can Name 50 Trees (\$15) + Mud Pies and Other Recipes (\$20)

Breaking news! The Nelson Scenic Loop turns 10 years old in June 2020. NELSON SCENIC LOOP The Nelson Scenic Loop is a 50 mile auto and bike tour that features Nelson County's bounty of natural, cultural, and historic attractions. Comprising Route 151, Route 664, the Blue Ridge Parkway, and Route 56, the Nelson Scenic Loop traverses both the lower foothills of the Piedmont as well as the summits of Virginia's Blue Ridge Mountains. Scenic and natural wonders abound. Hike the Appalachian Trail, visit Crabtree Falls, or stop at scenic overlooks on the Blue Ridge Parkway. Along the way visit breweries, cideries, apple and peach farm markets, pumpkin



patches, and more. Shop for crafts. Eat local food and enjoy the views from the many local restaurants. Begin your loop journey at the Rockfish Valley Foundation's Natural History Center on Route 151 in Wintergreen, VA.

In addition, the third annual **Old Wintergreen Day** is scheduled for October 11. There were 350 visitors and 20 exhibitors plus the old fire engine and Vietnam helicopter at our last event. Save the date for another fun day!
